Australian International PUPPET FESTIVAL

In becoming a Member of this Festival, you have chosen to throw yourself into ten days of vivid, varied activity which includes over two hundred performances, workshops, seminars and other events aimed at developing the arts of puppetry in Australia.

Puppeteers often need to be sculptors, writers, dancers, administrators, painters, carpenters and performers all rolled into one. Australian puppetry, still in its infancy, has drawn mainly on European traditions for its style, but Australia's geographical position is in Asia, alongside some of the richest traditions of puppetry in the world. The Australian International Puppet Festival features several examples of both European and Asian traditions and developments. There are also works from the U.S.A., a country with slightly more experience than Australia at adapting older traditions into a new Western culture. This Festival does not, however, aim for a sudden synthesis of East and West: rather an injection, or even a seepage from other cultures which may stimulate the growth of a puppetry tradition which is particularly Australian.

This Festival provides an opportunity to show audiences that puppetry has more possibilities than have ever been realised. It can hopefully provide us with as many stimulating ideas as we can accommodate. It can show that puppetry has great potential to survive and develop, contributing as it does so not only to live theatre but also to visual art, street theatre, television and film.

Whether you are here as Performer, Aficionado, Punch-ofall-Trades or Innocent Bystander - welcome. To those who have helped shape and create the Festival - thank you Please feel free to make the most of it, and make sure you enjoy it.

CARCLEW Youth Performing Arts Centre

After several years of rapid developments in youth performing arts activity in South Australia, the State Government initiated an Enquiry into Youth Performing Arts, which looked carefully at existing services and activity. The report concluded that Carclew should become the focal point for Youth Performing Arts in South Australia, a creative administrative hub of resources, projects, policy and support for youth performing arts. By this time the building and grounds had undergone a careful facelift, restoring them to some of their former glory.

A new Youth Performing Arts Council was appointed by the Minister of Arts, in 1980, responsible to him for overseeing the development of this exciting and important part of life and learning throughout South Australia. Among the Council's responsibilities are the supervision of Carclew itself and Theatre 62, a small, flexible theatre at Burbridge Road, Hilton which is now devoted to theatre by and for young people.

Carclew houses a Lending and Information Service, the Youth Arts Press, venues for meetings, rehearsals and other activities, the Schools Performing Arts Review Committee, and a National Office which links up with youth performing arts across the nation, produces the national magazine of youth performing arts, Lowdown, and is the Australian Centre for ASSITEJ, the International Association of Theatre for Children and Young People. In addition, Carclew provides a home for the National Music Camp Association which administrates the Australian Youth Orchestra, and the Association of Community Theatres.

To mark the establishment of Carclew as Australia's major centre for youth performing arts, the new Carclew Youth Performing Arts Centre was officially opened by on February 13th, 1982. The opening signifies the beginning of a new era of development and support for this most vital area of the arts.

The establishment of the Youth Performing Arts Council, based at Carclew, was a natural extension of South Australia's ongoing committment to the Arts. Successive State Governments have charged the Council with the responsibility of providing policy in the youth arts area, of making recommendations on the allocation of grants for youth performing companies, of co-ordinating the activities of companies working with or for young people and - most importantly for the Puppet Festival - of mounting events which are designed to develop youth performing arts in Australia.

When we were approached 12 months ago by two Melbourne puppeteers with the concept of presenting a Festival which would support, enhance and examine the current state of Australian puppetry, we had no hesitation in accepting the challenge. Through consultation and with the advice of field workers, the Festival program and workshops were pieced together by the tiny Carclew staff, while the State and Federal Governments and local sponsors all did their bit to bring the event to fruition. To all of them, admiration and thanks. And to all you practitioners in the art form - I hope we got most of it right.



Fabrics will be printed, painted and dyed, and performance skills including voice, movement, music, dance, mime, mask and puppetry will all be utilised.
