

At the last Co-op meeting, Greg Jones, organizer from Actors! Equity, came to speak. Here is a summary of his talk.

Equity has always maintained that a puppeteer is a performer, and therefore eligible for membership. A performer can join Equity if he/she can show proof of professional engagement (i.e. bookings). The entry fee and dues structure (see table below) can be, and often is, reduced on grounds of economic hardship.

There has been a restructuring within Equity just recently. The old system of Quarterly General Meetings has been replaced by one of an Annual General Meeting in September, supplemented by Special General Meetings as required, and Group and Cast meetings dealing with matters of special interest to the members concerned. Special interest meetings are held whenever and however the members see fit - there is no formal structure and no minimum number imposed by Equity.

Equity prepares submissions to inquiries, gives advice on grant submissions, handles workers' compensation claims, and can refer you to accountants and insurance companies conversant with matters of concern to performers.

A Free Legal Aid service has just been set up. It offers members free first consualtation for advice and assistance with any legal problem, including the making of a will, consumer complaints, tenancy problems, buying or selling a house, etc. Solicitors are available for this service between 5.00 pm and 7.00 pm on Fridays, so people needn't lose time from work, or alternatively at a convenient time during office hours.

Greg also spoke on other matters of interest.

Much was said on the subject of being ripped off. It seems that whenever you do a performance for a school, shopping centre, council, library, community centre, an fact whenever you are engaged by an organization, you are being employed by that organization, and they are obliged to pay you at award rates. In other words, they should not refuse to pay you a fee based on award rates. (see overleaf for a summary of current weekly and casual rates for performance) And, by the way, you and your audience are generally covered by their insurance. If you perform on your own premises or do a performance that is entirely of your own generation, you need your own insurance.

Television (this won't surprise you) is an area rank with instances of exploitation of performers. Channel 10's Early Bird Show was a classic case of "No, we don't pay you for being on (BEING) our programme, but think of what the exposure will do for you ". Documentary makers resist paying performers when they film them at work. The ABC has a policy of only paying award rates to union members - non-members can take what they're offered or starve. Channel 7 made \$220 million last year. The 9 Network made 343 million. The ABC is constricted more by lack of vision than lack of funds. TV can afford you. Also, you can backbill a television station for work done in the last five years for which you feel you have been inadequately paid.

The question of structuring your performing group as a company or as a partnership was discussed. It is an expensive business to form a company some mandreds of dellarm) but it affords certain protections not available to partnerships. Greg suggested that one type of company, the company limited by guarantee, can mitigate the problems caused by bank-optoy. In this arrangement, the company's articles of association state pertain amount of money to be contributed by each member - e.g. \$10 - and this amount, the guarantee limit, is the total liability of each partner should the company go bust. In the case of a partnership, each partner is liable for all the debts of the group, so that personal property and income are just as vulnerable as group assets when debts can't be met. On the question of pay within the group: if a group's income is not large, members cannot pay themselves at award rates. If you are a company, as directors of that company, members are responsible for all financial organization, and cannot be bound by any award.

Greg also provided a little background on Equity's past lack of involvement with puppetry.

wards are either Federal or State determined. State determinations cover everyone not named in the Federal award. Puppetcers were deliberately not named under the Federal award back when the Elizabethan Theatre Trust was esting up the Larionnette Theatre of Australia. The Trust maintained that the cost of Federal award payments to puppeteers would be prohibitive, and Equity agreed to allow them to fix their own rates of pay,

In the past, in Victoria, some employers, notably the Parry Marshall Puppet Theatre and Pilgrim Pup et Theatre, actively discouraged union membership among their employees, and fostered the belief that puppeteers were not even eligible for Equity membership. Consequently, few Victorian puppeteers have joined the union, there has been little feedback to the union, and thus little union involvement in our field.

THE GARDNER PUPPET THEATED.

Morrie Gardner has kindly provided some notes on her current programme ...

"UNDER SHARK BAY " - for primary schools. This programme begins with a me fishing game as a participation item by the whole audience. This not only sets the scene for the play to follow but teaches ways of simple making as well. The play itself has a historical setting during

the voyages of William Dampier down the coast of Western Australia in 1688 and 1698. Basically it is a fantasy story about a ship boy, Frederick who falls overboard from the Cygnet to be rescued by a pirate, and later involved in an underwater adventure. Frederick, a very shy boy, discovers his own self-esteem during his adventures. This story is told live by Ralph and Lorrie, making use of a theatre with scenery and lighting effects. Music only is on tape. We vary the play slightly for different age groups, more emphasis on history for the older children. Puppets are both glove and rod, with one simple marionnette and shadow puppet included.

TRE*SCHOOL PROGRAMME. This is especially written for very young children. It consists of two short plays done in the theatre with glove puppets at the beginning and end of the programmo. This year we use a family situation story and one using Australian animal puppets. Between these theatre plays we do participation items with the children in front of the theatre, including our two caterpillars, where all the children in the audience hold onto the long caterpillars and dance them around the kindergarten.

In second term we have many more pre-school programmes than primary ones, but we recommend visitors to see the new primary programme "Under Shark Bay" if at all possible.

EXTRACT from the DETERMINATION OF THE ENTERTAINMENT EMPLOYEES (PERFORMERS) BOARD of VICTORIA.

Minimum rates of pay for artists performing at dances, cabarets, hetels restaurants and theatres from January 4th, 4980.

WEEKLY: Variety artist/entertainer/actor Chorus / ballet

\$ 167.70

\$ 159,20

Holiday Pay: A sum equalling 1/12 of the total ordinary wages paid during the engagement shall be paid as Annual Holiday Paymen Payment at the END of the engagement, regardless of the length of engagement or salary - Annual Holiday Payment is calculated on the actual wage paid to an artist and not on the award minimum.

In addition, a sum equal to 172% of one twelfth of the applicable rate shall be paid as a loading.

Sunday work : one third of the weekly rate additional to the weekly rate.

Public Holidays: one sixth of the weekly rate additional to the weekly rate for Labour Day, Good Friday & Christmas Day. One twelfth of the weekly rate additional to the weekly rate for all other holidays.

During the 3 weeks preceding the opening performance -REHEARSALS:

a) up to 36 hours per week
b) Between 36 and 48 hours
c) over 48 hours per week
c) over 48 hours

Prior to the 3 weeks preseding performance -

a) up to 20 hours per week 1/2 weekly rate "
b) between 20 and 30 hours 3/4 weekly rate "
