A NEW PRODUCTION FOR 1988

For 1988 The Marionette Theatre of Australia is staging a new production of Norman Lindsay's "The Magic Pudding". First published in 1918, "The Magic Pudding", with its simple episodic plot telling of the running battle between The Pudding Owners and The Pudding Thieves, immediately endeared itself to Australians everywhere. Seventy years later Lindsay's book is firmly established as one of the classics.

Fifty years after the publication of the Pudding, Lindsay wrote in a letter that "one night during the 1914 war I was sitting glumly in my studio. It was only a desperation expedient to avert my thoughts from a war of mind and blood ... that I started writing some nonsense about a bear named Bunyip Bluegum ... from that point on the little book wrote itself". That little book is full of gusto and an unselfconscious vitality, it is vigorous and warm. Lindsay's creative use of language in the freewheeling invective of his colourful characters is brilliant and uniquely Australian. Who else but Lindsay could have written ... "Of all the swivel-eyed, up-jumped, cross-grained sons of a cock-eyed tinker, if punching parrots on the beak wasn't too painful for pleasure, I'd land you a sockdolager on the muzzle that'd lay you out till Christmas"?

The first presentation of the "Pudding" on the puppet stage was a marionette version by Peter Scriven in 1958. Since that time the Marionette Theatre has kept the story in its repertoire, not only as a piece for marionettes, but also, in 1980, using rod-puppets. The 1988 production is strikingly different from previous versions, incorporating a variety of styles of puppetry. The puppet characters for this production are based on original designs by Lindsay himself. Lindsay is recognised as one of the finest caricaturists of his generation and his characters for "The Magic Pudding" allowed his inventive skills free rein. A feature of this new production is that Norman Lindsay is portrayed on stage as a participant in his own creation, adding another historical perspective to the already rich texture of the production.

Those who saw the first production some thirty years ago with their parents, can now return with their own children to re-live the joys of "chasing and fighting and Pudding-eating" in this new presentation. The style of puppetry has evolved, the staging is different and exciting, but Lindsay's vitality and verve is unchanged. Those who know and love the book can share it with a new generation ... and for those who have never tasted the Pudding, a uniquely Australian experience is in store for them.



Peter Scriven creates "The 1956 Tintookies" and introduces a generation to the magical world of puppetry, with this uniquely Australian marionette production.

Scriven's company 1965 becomes a division of The Australian Elizabethan Theatre Trust, along with The Australian Opera and The Australian Ballet and is now named The Marionette Theatre of Australia.

Under the direction of world-renowed puppeteer, Richard Bradshaw, The Marionette Theatre of Australia becomes an autonomous company, supported by the Commonwealth and NSW Governments.

After extensive renovation 1983 of an historic building in The Rocks, Sydney, the company at last has its own permanent home, incorporating a theatre and workshop facilities.

The Marionette TODAY Theatre of Australia has one simple goal - the provision of fine theatrical productions for children. The company performs regularly at The Rocks Theatre in Sydney and tours nationally. The Marionete Theatre of Australia is developing a repertoire of productions based on the classics of children's literature, introducing a new generation to this rich heritage of imagination and discovery, education and exploration through the magical world of puppetry.

And an Answer to an often-asked question

In English the word "marionette" describes a style of puppet operated by strings. In its current productions The Marionette Theatre of Australia makes use of many different styles of puppetry. however we retain the name "Marionette" in recognition of the origins of our company over 30 years ago and of the

efforts of the hundreds of puppeteers, puppet-makers, designers, writers, musicians, actors, administrators and directors who have worked over the years to make the Marionette Theatre of Australia such a part of the Australian tradition.
